Dear Colleagues,



## Message from the Visitor



## Honorary Patron: The Hon. Elizabeth Dowdeswell





As the Crown's representative in Ontario, the Lieutenant Governor exercises constitutional powers and promotes a strong and positive civic community.

## Honorary Senior Fellow: Gimaa (Chief) Stacey Laforme



R. Stacey Laforme was the elected Chief of the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation (MCFN).

Born and raised on MCFN, Chief Laforme was first elected to council in 1999 and served his community for over twenty years. Chief Laforme was committed to increasing involvement and communication between Elected Council and both on and off-reserve membership. He was very active throughout MCFN's Treaty Lands and Territory, which encompasses 3.9 million acres of Southern Ontario, not only as a Chief, but as a notable storyteller, poet and published author.

Chief Laforme was appointed as honorary Senior Fellow for Massey College, joining His Royal Highness the late Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh and the Chancellor of Oxford as the third person awarded the highest honour the College can bestow.

## 60th Anniversary Celebrations

Fall 2023 marked the 60th anniversary of Massey College – not just as an architectural gem and residence in the heart of the University of Toronto, but also as a hub for interdisciplinary and intergenerational thinkers to come together in the exchange of ideas, to form a unique community.

To celebrate, the College hosted a variety of events to honour the occasion starting with the annual *Alumni Association Annual General Meeting and BBQ* in the summer. New alumni were elected to council to continue the important role they serve in the community. In August, 40 members of the Massey community attended the Toronto Blue Jays Game for a very fun outing.

In September, we hosted our annual *Welcome Barbeque* which was a successful intergenerational affair where we welcomed new community members over delicious food in the Quad. One of the many interests at Massey is the arts, from music, to literature, to film. *Massey's War Film Society Kriegsfilme* hosted a special screening of "The Master and the Commander" after several rounds of voting from the community during the summer.

The second week of the term saw Senior Fellow **Chad**

**Gaffield** delivered the Inaugural *Irving Abella Lecture entitled: Machines and Minds: Pursuing Inclusive History in a Turbulent World*. The following day we showed our appreciation for Principal Emeritus **Hugh Segal**, who passed away in early August, by celebrating his intellectual contributions to Canada. We heard from former Premier of Quebec **Jean Charest** who spoke "On Conservatism" and took in panels on Hugh's social policy and domestic impact as well as his experience with global policy, foreign and defense policy. We were delighted to hear a keynote address from former Lieutenant Governor **Elizabeth Dowdeswell** at our *Public Policy Symposium Changing the FLOW: The Future of Freshwater in Canada* which looked at the environmental, economic, governance and legal issues around freshwater.

High Tables are a longstanding tradition at Massey. On September 28, our community filled The Great Hall at Hart House for the *60th Anniversary High Table*. Members from across the community came together in celebration of our College's history and hope for our future. We were delighted by several musical performances, many special guests and a [wonderful short film](#) highlighting the true nature of the College and community.



To gain insight into our rich history, we assembled a panel comprised of past and present Dons of Hall. We heard diverse stories and perspectives regarding this unique role, and how it has evolved over the past six decades. Current Don **Robbie Steele** moderated the discussion asking about the responsibilities, traditions, and joys of the role. We were joined by **Georges Monette** (1976-1977), **Ian Mallory** (1983-1984), **Jane Hilderman** (2009-2010) and **Christine Tran** (2021-2022). They enlightened us on the myriad of duties they were responsible for and the unique things that mysteriously developed as a Massey tradition, including the origins of the new Don going into the pond after *Convocation High Table*.



Since 1963, environmental degradation and unsustainable consumption have emerged as some of the most important problems facing the globe. Junior Fellows **Karan Kapur** and **Keagan Rankin** Chaired Massey's *Sustainability Conference: Ensuring Prosperity in the Next 60 Years* in early October. Supported by our Environmentalist-in-

Residence Sir **Graham Watson**, the conference tackled questions of the future of sustainability. Sessions explored climate and sustainable technology research, responsible finance/ entrepreneurship, Indigenous perspectives on sustainability, and policy solutions.



Every year we are privileged to hold High Tables honoring and celebrating Indigenous, Muslim and LGBTQ+ communities in the fall. Mayor **Olivia Chow**, Gimaa **Stacey Laforme** and **Phil Fontaine** all spoke at the Indigenous High Table. At the High Table *Celebrating Muslim Communities* we heard an impassioned speech from **Amira Elghawaby**, Canada's Special Representative on Combatting Islamophobia. In November, we welcomed multidisciplinary artist **Vivek Shraya** who spoke about the importance of a space and event like the Massey's Pride High Table for queer communities and shared a new holiday song about chosen family. Taking the opportunity to begin modern traditions, **Anita McGahan**, Vice Chair of the Governing Board was our honored host. We had a new High Table Celebrating the Arts in Canada with special performances by Canadian singer-songwriter and composer **Sarah Sleat** and **Ahmed Moneka** & The Moneka Arabic Jazz Group. William Southam Journalism Fellow **Garvia Bailey** hosted the evening, continuing the new tradition.

In late November, activity was at a high at Massey. We organized three full day conferences.

On International Children's Day, November 20, we co-hosted the *United for Justice: War Crimes Against Ukraine's Children*, bringing together global leaders, experts in human rights and justice, and members of civil society to call for accountability for Russian war crimes and for the urgent and safe repatriation of abducted Ukrainian children.

Our Chair in Human Rights, **Payam Akhavan**, brought forward the idea and forged partnerships with the Office of the Prosecutor General of Ukraine, Global Affairs Canada, the Embassy of Ukraine in Canada, and The Raoul Wallenberg Centre for Human Rights to organize this timely discussion.

We welcomed high profile guests including: **Mélanie Joly**, Minister of Foreign Affairs of Canada; **Arif Virani**, Minister of Justice and Attorney General of Canada; **Andriy Kostin**, Prosecutor General of Ukraine; **Irwin Cotler**, Founding Chair of Raoul Wallenberg Centre for Human Rights; **Didier Reynders**, EU Commissioner for Justice and Competition; and **Beth Van Schaack**, U.S. Ambassador for Global Criminal Justice.

On November 24, Massey held *POWER TO THE ARTS: Reimagining Relationships in the Canadian Creative and Cultural Sector*. Four Junior Fellows, **Thomas Ayouti**, **Elizabeth Hicks**, **Sam Little** and **Michael O'Keeffe** spearheaded the symposium. It positioned Massey College as a broker of an important national conversation with which it has a historical link through Vincent Massey and the Massey Report. The day ended with the new High Table.

The following week, we hosted the conference on *Cooperation, Stability, and Security in the Arctic? Strategies for Moving Forward* led by Senior Fellow **Elizabeth Ridell-Dixon**. This conference focused on prospects for enhancing cooperation rather than on defining problems with national and international speakers. Senior Fellow at the Wilson Center, **Evan T. Bloom**, was the keynote speaker.

In late November and early December, we had the chance to celebrate several festivities – festivals of light (Diwali and Chanukah), the annual kids and families party and the *Winter Gaudy*. We wrapped up the term with reflections on the CBC Massey Lectures and by examining Artificial Intelligence (AI) as it relates to creativity with our Royal Society of Canada partners and healthcare opportunities and challenges.

# The Massey Dialogues

Founded in 2020, to continue the exchange of ideas on broad themes during a time of being apart, the Massey Dialogues have been and continue to be a dynamic series for the College. The salon style panel discussions are informed by community members who want to present ideas related to their research and other interest areas. Junior Fellows regularly participate in the Dialogues by bringing forward topics and themes, inviting experts, and moderating or participating in the panels themselves. Members of the College have been integral to the series' success by sharing thoughtful and engaging ideas.

Many of the events have been livestreamed and recorded to our YouTube channel which now has over 300 videos, 1,300 subscribers, nearly 100,000 views and over 15,000 watch time hours. In 2022-2023, we held 17 Dialogues, 14 of which had participation from one or more Junior Fellow or recent Junior Fellow Alum.

In 2022-2023, the Massey Dialogues series continued to flourish. Topics for the discussions were as varied as the community itself. Here are a few examples:

## [Preparing for the Future Workplace](#)

To kick off the school term, pharmaceutical scientist and Junior Fellow **Chukwunonso Nwabufo** moderated a panel which considered the irrevocable transformation of work from the onset of the pandemic. The panel explored and considered how to prepare for the future workplace. They examined why focusing on new habits matters as a means of managing in the changing world of work and how we prepare for an uncertain future. We were joined by Executive Coach and Advisor for Harvard Business Review **Sheila Goldgrab**, Biomedical Engineering MASc student and Junior Fellow **Evan Davison-Kotler** and Massey College Principal and Law Professor **Nathalie Des Rosiers**.

## **Women, Visibility, and Power in Arts and Cultural Industries**

While protections against discrimination based on gender, sex, race, etc. are enshrined in our laws, that does not mean everyone is treated equitably. Visiting Scholar alum Dr. **Rita Shelton Deverell**, William Southam Journalism Fellow **Omayra Issa** and Junior Fellows **Lola Ajao**, **Elizabeth Hicks**, and **Zahida Rahemtulla** brainstormed survival techniques; long-game strategies to thrive; creative uses of power; and the role of allies and bystanders in 2023 for women, women of colour and their colleagues. This session broke down the barriers between speakers and attendees with a full circle discussion.

## [Omiwatari: Documentary Screening and Dialogue on the Cultural Losses of Climate Change](#)

Junior Fellow **Zeesy Powers** screened her short documentary *Omiwatari*, which depicts the first year in memory that Lake Suwa, Japan, the site of a millennia-old phenomenon, remained ice-free all winter. Within the next 50 years, the gods of this lake, whose annual reunion across the ice brought good fortune and balance between humans and nature, will never meet again. Zeesy moderated a conversation with biologist and Senior Fellow Dr. **Sapna Sharma** and filmmaker and **Jennifer Baichwal** on the central theme of the film: we are the cause, and it is up to us to find a way forward for ourselves.

## [175 Years of Canadian Democracy](#)

Uninterrupted by civil wars or dictatorships, Canadian democracy is now 175 years old. It is the oldest continuous democratic federation in the world and one of the oldest continuous democracies of any type. Senior Fellow **John Ralston Saul**, Journalism Fellow **Omayra Issa** and alum **Kia Dunn** discussed fundamental questions like:

- How has Canada lived up to the ideals set out in 1848?
- What does the future of Canadian democracy look like?

The Dialogues was co-organized by **John Ralston Saul** & alum **Thilo Schaefer**.

# The CBC Massey Lectures 2023



The **CBC Massey Lectures** are a partnership between CBC, House of Anansi Press and Massey College, providing a forum where contemporary thinkers can explore important issues of our time. Established to honour Vincent Massey in 1961, the annual lectures are broadcast from across Canada by the CBC

and the text is published by House of Anansi Press.

These days, everyone feels insecure. The status quo isn't working for anyone, even those who appear to have it all. What is going on? In this urgent cultural diagnosis, author and activist **Astra Taylor** exposes how seemingly disparate crises—rising inequality and declining mental health, the ecological emergency, and the threat of authoritarianism—originate from a social order built on insecurity.


Mixing social critique, memoir, history, political analysis, and philosophy, this genre-bending book rethinks both insecurity and security from the ground up. Taylor argues, we can begin to develop more caring, inclusive, and sustainable forms of security to help us better weather the challenges ahead. The Age of Insecurity will transform how you understand yourself and society—while illuminating a path toward meaningful change.



## Nurturing Learning – the Massey College Junior Fellowship Program

The Massey Junior Fellows Professional Program supports our Junior Fellows in building their capacity as future leaders. The learning objectives include:

- Capacity to engage the public on complex ideas
- Act as an ethical and inclusive leader
- Cultivate skills to participate in international networks
- Demonstrate the ability to develop interdisciplinary approaches
- Engage in the practice of wellbeing

In 2023-24, we welcomed back several facilitators of the Junior Fellows Professional Program. Senior Fellow **Kim Kierans** hosts panels and workshops on improving writing, presenting and interviewing skills. Changemaker-in-Residence, **Peter Sloly** facilitates workshops on leading in times of change, challenge and crisis. **Shelina Kassam** and **Shazyia Ladak** continue their impactful series on Islamophobia.

This year, we have the great honour of three new additions to the programing. Senior Fellow **Nurjehan Mawani** became Massey's Chair of Global Engagement. She has leveraged her professional connections to provide small groups of Junior Fellows with incredible experiences, such as a trip to the ROM with Chief Justice **Beverly McLaughlin** for a group of Law students. **Sir Graham Watson** is our Environmentalist-in-Residence. His impactful film series and his involvement in the Sustainability Conference this autumn reached a wide audience of Junior Fellows and generated important conversations about some of the biggest issues we faced as we move towards an uncertain future. **David Scrymgeour** is the Entrepreneur-in-Residence and has been of considerable benefit to the Massey Venture Society (MVS) founded by the Junior Fellows. MVS strives to obtain mentorship, network and learn about the professional pathways and experiences in business start-up and a range of other related topics from the Senior members of the Massey community.

We are grateful for this group and their dedication to the Junior Fellows Professional Program.

# The William Southam Journalism Fellowship

The [William Southam Journalism Fellowship](#) program has been an integral part of the Massey College community. Since 1962, the program has awarded over 250 esteemed Canadian and international journalists with a full academic year of education, reflection and fellowship.

This year we have welcomed five fellows:

## Webster McConnell Fellow – Garvia Bailey

Garvia Bailey is a co-founder of the award-winning production company Media Girlfriends, which amplifies underrepresented voices in media. Garvia’s career spans two decades as a producer, host, and columnist for the CBC and JazzFM and as a freelance journalist. She hosted, co-wrote and co-produced the award-winning Canadian Black history podcast series, *Strong and Free/Fort et Libre*. She is co-creator of a Carleton University course Storytelling with a Focus on Podcasting.

## CBC Radio-Canada Fellow – Julia Caron

Julia Caron is the host of Quebec AM, Quebec’s only English-language province-wide daily morning show. She freelanced and was a regular contributor to *Shameless Magazine*, *Racialicious*, *Jezebel* and had successful features in *Al-Jazeera* and *WORN Journal*. She holds a BA Honours from Trent University and a Masters in Documentary Film Studies from Université Laval.

## William Southam Journalism Fellow – Hamutal Dotan

Hamutal Dotan is an award-winning editor, editorial consultant, and journalism teacher in Toronto with fifteen years of experience in magazine, newspaper, digital, and broadcast journalism. Previously she was senior editor at The Walrus, Focus editor at the Globe and Mail, and editor-in-chief of *Torontoist*, as well as a political analyst for the CBC.

## St. Clair Balfour Fellow – Anna Mehler Paperny

Anna Mehler Paperny is an award-winning reporter with Reuters, covering everything from migration to health to justice. She’s worked at *The Globe and Mail* and developed [globalnews.ca](#)’s Investigative Data Desk. Her work on deaths in Canadian

prisons won an RTDNA Dan McArthur Award for investigative journalism. Anna’s debut book, *Hello I Want to Die Please Fix Me: Depression in the First Person*, was a national bestseller.

## CJFE / Massey College Fellow – Hasan Shaaban, Lebanon

Hasan Shaaban is a freelance photojournalist from Beirut, Lebanon who moved to Canada after facing death threats for his reporting. After covering Lebanon for years, the risk became too great. When he was covering water shortages in a southern village, Hezbollah members threatened and attacked him and he was forced to flee.. Hasan has freelanced for many outlets including *The Guardian*, *The Washington Post*, *The Globe and Mail* and *Der Tagesspiegel*.

Senior Fellow **Robert Johnson**, academic advisor to the William Southam Journalism Fellows retired last year. We would like to extend a huge thank you to him for years of service and support to this program. We are pleased to announce that Professor Ian Williams joined the College for 2023-2024 for a first term of three years effective September 2023 to advise the journalists.

## Ian Williams

is the author of six books of fiction, nonfiction, and poetry. His latest book, *Disorientation*, considers the impact of racial encounters on ordinary people.

His novel, *Reproduction*, won the Scotiabank Giller Prize and was published in Canada, the US, the UK, and Italy. His poetry collection, *Raymond Souster*





Award winner, *Word Problems*, converts the ethical and political issues of our time into math and grammar problems. His previous collection, *Personals*, was shortlisted for the Griffin Poetry Prize and the Robert Kroetsch Poetry Book Award. His short story collection, *Not Anyone's Anything*, won the Danuta Gleed Literary Award for the best first collection of short fiction in Canada. His first book, *You Know Who You Are*, was a finalist for the ReLit Poetry Prize. He is a trustee for the Griffin Poetry Prize.

Williams completed his Ph.D. at the University of Toronto. After several years teaching poetry in the School of Creative Writing at the University of British Columbia, Williams returned to the University of Toronto as a tenured professor of English. He was the 2014-2015 Canadian Writer-in-Residence for the University of Calgary's Distinguished Writers Program.

## Chairs



Senior Fellow **Payam Akhavan** is the inaugural holder of the Massey Chair in Human Rights. Payam will share his experiences and scholarship as a distinguished human rights lawyer before international courts and tribunals. As Massey College Chair in Human Rights, Payam will deliver public lectures annually, convene seminars and discussion groups with

Junior Fellows, and participate in College activities related to human rights.

Senior Fellow **Thomas Axworthy** continues as Massey's Chair in Public Policy. With a distinguished career in government, academia, and philanthropy, he served as the Principal Secretary to Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau, and was a key strategist on repatriation of the Constitution and the Charter of Rights and Freedoms. Tom leverages his connections from decades of service to organize events discussing critical policy issues at Massey. He collaborates with Junior Fellows to organize events such as the annual Walter Gordon Symposium and introduces the fellowship to prominent figures in the public policy realm.



Senior Fellow **Nurjehan Mawani** is the inaugural Massey Chair in Global Engagement. In this role, Nurjehan will broaden Massey's international outreach and partnerships, furthering the College's mission to nurture the development of the next generation of high-caliber, ethical leaders as they conceive innovative solutions to the complex problems facing our world. As part of her mandate, she will provide leadership mentoring to Massey's international cohort of Junior Fellows, connecting them to changemakers across Canada and around the world to foster a deeper understanding of global issues, and their impact in Canada.



## Residencies

Senior Fellow **Andromache Karakatsanis** is a senior justice of the Supreme Court of Canada, appointed in 2011. A judge since 2002, she served first as a trial judge of the Ontario Superior Court of Justice and then as a judge of the Ontario Court of Appeal. Before her appointment to the bench, she worked in the justice system in diverse capacities over two decades: as a Law Clerk to the Ontario Court of Appeal; lawyer in private practice; as Chair and CEO of a regulatory tribunal; as Secretary of Native Affairs for Ontario; and as Deputy Minister of Justice and Deputy Attorney General of Ontario. She then served as Deputy Minister to the Premier, Secretary of the Cabinet, Clerk of the Privy Council and Head of the Ontario Public Service.




**David Scrymgeour** is the inaugural Massey College Entrepreneur-in-Residence. He is an Adjunct Professor at the Schools of Engineering and Management, University of Toronto. He is also an Executive in Residence at the Said Business School and a Business Fellow at the School of Enterprise



and Environment, Oxford University. For the majority of his career, David engaged as a trouble-shooter, consultant and founder of over a dozen organisations. He supports the Massey Venture Society, founded by a Junior Fellowship alum.

**Shyam Selvadurai** is an award-winning Sri Lankan-Canadian novelist and our 2024 Writer-in-Residence. His first novel, *Funny Boy* (1994), won the W.H. Smith/ Books in Canada First Novel Award and the Lambda Literary Award for Gay Fiction. Selvadurai co-authored the screenplay for this novel's film adaptation (dir. Deepa Mehta). His most recent book is *Mansions of the Moon* (2022). Selvadurai is also the editor of two anthologies, *Story-wallah! A Celebration of South Asian Fiction* and *Many Roads through Paradise: An Anthology of Sri Lankan Literature*. Shyam's books have been published in the US, the UK and India, and appeared in translation in Europe and the Middle East.



**Peter Sloly** returns to his appointment as Changemaker-in-Residence in recognition of his extensive expertise and experience leading organizational and cultural change as well as for his life-long role as a champion for diversity, equity, inclusion, and anti-racism. He helps the Principal to advance overall culture and organizational change

in the institution while facilitating leadership development initiatives for the Junior Fellows. He offers a leadership series to the Junior Fellowship.



Sir **Graham Watson** is the Massey Environmentalist in Residence and a European political leader best known for his roles as Leader of the European Parliament's Liberals (2002-09) and President of the European Union's Liberal Democratic Party (2011-15). During his twenty-year career as a Member of the European Parliament, he co-founded

The Climate Parliament a global network of legislators. Sir Graham is an adjunct Professor at U of T's Munk School of Global Affairs and Public Policy. At Massey, he supported Junior Fellows in the Sustainability Conference, co-facilitated a bike tour of cycling infrastructure downtown and organized a weekly film screening on environmental issues.

### Visiting Scholars

[Visiting Scholars](#) are invited to Massey College to enrich the community and share their unique perspectives with the Fellowship.

**Keith Bresnahan** – OCAD University  
Keith Bresnahan is Associate Professor of design history and theory at OCAD University in Toronto, specializing in the histories of architecture, urbanism, visual communication and typography. His research explores the politics of architectural destruction and reconstruction, symbols and visual signs in communication, and histories of emotion in design and urbanism. During the sabbatical year 2023-24, he is completing a book manuscript on emotion and the reconstruction of Paris after the 1871 Commune.

**Nicole Collins** – OCAD University  
Nicole Collins' extensive body of artwork reflects on time, memory, grief, accumulation, force, and heat on visceral and ephemeral materials, especially through painting with encaustic, the application of molten, pigment-infused wax. Her oeuvre also includes performative drawing, digital reproduction, installation, intervention, video, and sound. Her work has been shown in solo and group exhibitions in Canada and abroad. Nicole lives in Toronto and is an award-winning educator and Associate Professor of Material and Visual Culture in the Drawing & Painting program at the Ontario College of Art & Design University (OCADU).



**Laura Kwak** – York University

Laura Kwak is Associate Professor in Socio-legal Studies and Sociology, York University. Professor Kwak is also appointed to graduate programs in Socio-Legal Studies, Sociology, and Interdisciplinary Studies. Her interdisciplinary socio-legal research focuses on the intersections of race, law, and the politics of representation. As a critical race scholar, she draws from her training in sociology, equity studies, and gender studies to investigate questions about how discourses of racial progress operate to sustain racial hierarchies.

**Danielle Lamb** – Toronto Metropolitan University

Dr. Danielle Lamb is an Associate Professor in the Organizational Behavior and Human Resource Management department of the Ted Rogers School of Management at Toronto Metropolitan University. Danielle’s research focuses on employment and earnings disparities among historically marginalized workers in Canada. Her doctoral research was an empirical examination of earnings, employment and education among Indigenous groups in Canada. She also explores issues related to immigrant earnings and union wage premia. While Danielle continues to research Indigenous labour market outcomes, her most recent line of work focuses on non-standard forms of employment with a lens to exploring how such work arrangements may create or exacerbate economic inequalities.

**Asmaa Malik** – Toronto Metropolitan University

TMU Associate Professor Asmaa Malik’s research and teaching interests focus on journalism innovation, equity in media and collaborative approaches to graduate supervision. With her research partner, Gavin Adamson, she is the co-recipient of 2020 Google News Initiative Innovation Challenge funding to develop an AI-powered tool that assesses news sourcing and along with her colleague Sonya Fatah she is working on a SSHRC-funded project to create a diversity survey for Canadian newsrooms. She is also the Velma Rogers Research Co-Chair at the School of Journalism. She has held several editorial leadership roles at the Montreal Gazette and Toronto Star and her work has appeared in The Washington Post, The Walrus and Toronto Star. During her time at Massey, she will be completing her work on equity in Canadian newsrooms and researching the experiences of racialized journalists who have long fought for rightful representation in media institutions across North America.

**Ruth Panofsky** – Toronto Metropolitan University

Ruth Panofsky is Professor of English at Toronto Metropolitan University, where she teaches Canadian Literatures and Holocaust Literature. Her research has been supported by fellowships and grants from SSHRC, the Bibliographical Society of America, the Bibliographical Society of Canada, the Canada Council for the Arts, and the Ontario Arts Council. She received the Louis Rosenberg Canadian Jewish Studies Distinguished Service Award in 2017 and the Sarwan Sahota Distinguished Scholar Award for outstanding contribution to knowledge or artistic creativity in 2016. Dr. Panofsky is also a Fellow of the Royal Society. Currently, she is working on a SSHRC-funded study of publisher Anna Porter and Key Porter Books.

**Gillian Parekh** – York University

Dr. Gillian Parekh is an Associate Professor and Canada Research Chair in Disability Studies in Education within the Faculty of Education at York. Gillian is cross-appointed with York’s graduate program in Critical Disability studies. As a previous teacher in special education and research coordinator with the Toronto District School Board (TDSB), Gillian has conducted extensive system and school-based research in Toronto in the areas of structural equity, special education, and academic streaming. In particular, her work explores how schools construct and respond to disability as well as how students are organized across programs and systems.

**Cindy Poremba** – OCAD University

Cindy Poremba is an Associate Professor in Digital Futures at OCAD University (Tkaranto/Toronto), and Co-Director of OCAD’s game:play Lab. They have maintained a scholarly, experimental gamemaking, and curatorial practice for almost two decades with a particular interest in captured media practices, and emerging technologies. Cindy has published and presented extensively on topics relating to game art, postmedia, and interactive documentary. Their award-winning game, curation, and “New Arcade” work (independently and as a member of kokoromi collective), has been featured in both game and digital art exhibitions.

The [2023 Laureates](#) were honoured at the Clarkson Laureates High Table on January 27, 2023 in the presence of their peers and family. In addition to their citation, Massey College made a donation to the charity of their choice.



**Rakshith Ramesh** was completing his Master of Applied Science at the Faculty of Applied Sciences and Engineering. Rakshith is the program co-chair for the “Massey is Lunch” program, and was instrumental in its creation and successful implementation. “Massey Is Lunch” pairs Junior Fellows with Senior Members of the College for an informal

lunch in Ondaatje Hall. This program has been invaluable to the intergenerational connections post pandemic. Most recently, Rakshith volunteered his time and talent to help organize the first ever Multiculturalism High Table in celebration of South Asian communities. Outside of Massey and before coming to the University of Toronto, Rakshith demonstrated a strong commitment to community service – volunteering for the Abdul Latif Jameel Poverty Action Lab, the Suvidya Foundation as well as the Parikrma Humanity foundation where he provided one-on-one coaching for middle school students who were struggling in mathematics.



**Caitlin Salvino** is a resident Junior Fellow and a JD candidate at the Faculty of Law. Caitlin is Co-Chair of the Junior Fellow-led Accessibility Committee. Caitlin spearheaded and co-facilitated the “Just Ask” workshop at Massey, aimed at having Junior Fellows with disabilities share their experiences with the fellowship and with

Massey staff. This event helped to raise critical and crucial awareness of disability at Massey, and position Massey College as a space where disability is present, and where all are welcome. Caitlin has worked closely with the Lionel Massey Fund to ensure that events are organized with accessibility in mind, and encourages

all accessibility needs be met. In addition to Caitlin’s involvement at Massey College, her scholarship and activism is impressive, both within the U of T Faculty of Law and outside of it. Currently, Caitlin is the co-president of the Disabled Law Students’ Association, and has successfully advocated for reform to the Faculty of Law’s Financial Aid Policy in order to meet the needs of disabled students, the creation of a lecture recordings policy for disabled students as well as the hiring of a specialist in disability at the Faculty of Law.

**David R. Smith** is a tireless advocate and volunteer for Massey College. As Chair of the Quadrangle Society, member of the Governing Board and Co-Chair of the Senior Member Selection Committee, David is enormously generous with his time and has lent his expertise in strategic leadership, governance, financial acumen and capacity building in



helping to create the Massey College Strategic Plan, supporting the Massey College annual appeal and the upcoming capital campaign. His commitment to public service extends well beyond Massey College. David is the past Chair of Rise, a national microfinancing not-for-profit that supports entrepreneurs with histories of mental health or addiction issues. He has contributed to numerous councils, advisory groups and committees for both the University of Toronto and Rotman where he was recognized for his outstanding service with the Arbour Award, the highest volunteer honour granted by the University. He also supports Canada’s essential family enterprise ecosystem in many ways including through his peer leadership with Family Enterprise Canada sitting on their FEA Institute Committee of the Board and was an inaugural member of their national FEA Council. David also enjoys mentoring and guest lecturing.

## Partnerships

Partnerships with institutions increase Massey's visibility both nationally and internationally and bring a wealth of opportunities, interactions and programming for our Junior Fellows, Senior Members, Journalism Fellows and Visiting Scholars.

Massey College and the **Aga Khan Museum** created a series of events on the Global Legacy of Rumi, and created the opportunities for Junior Fellows to join panel discussions examining the life and timeless impact of one of history's famous poets.

**The Literary Review of Canada** and Massey College continue to publish the annual Massey Essay. This year, literary critic James Brooke-Smith penned the essay *Where's Johnny: on the lost art of conversation* in the May issue. [Read more.](#)

In partnership with the **German Consulate** in Toronto, Massey College hosted the fifth annual German Canadian Media Symposium (GMCS) and addressed the topic, *How Can Journalism Counter the War Propaganda?* [Watch here.](#)

Massey College's relationship with **The Mississauga of the Credit First Nation** led to the establishment of an annual Anishinaabemowin Program for the Massey Community. These free

courses cover the basic tools for community members to learn Anishinaabemowin independently or in the community.

Massey continues to have strong relationships with **Toronto Metropolitan University, OCAD University** and **York University** – each institution rents an office annually and recommends scholars on sabbatical that then become Visiting Scholars at Massey College. This income supports College programming and these academics enrich our community and increase the College's intergenerational and interdisciplinary mandate.

Massey continues to work with the **Department of English** to support the Jack McClelland Writing Residency. In Fall 2022, David Chariandy resided at Massey and offered a non-credit writing seminar.

In Massey's 60th year, we will work with partners to create opportunities to celebrate longstanding partnerships and to forge new ones. We are revisiting 60 years of the CBC Massey Lectures, working with **House of Anansi Press** and CBC Ideas to record programming at Massey to be broadcast nationally.



# Gi-Chi-Twaa Gimaa Nini Mississauga Anishinaabek AName Amik

The newly constituted [Chapel Royal](#) Committee began meeting in the late spring of 2022 and made a number of important contributions to the College in its first year.

Over the summer, committee members oversaw the production of a video about the Chapel Royal, titled *Learning Together*. Massey community members reflected on the importance of the Chapel Royal in the project of Reconciliation.

A ceremony was held in the Quadrangle to awaken the drum which had been gifted to the College. Councillor Kelly LaForme of the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation (MCFN) led the ceremony, which included dancing. Throughout the year, Councillor LaForme guided a group of Junior Fellows in crafting drum sticks and learning how to care for the drum, and an inaugural drumming circle was held in the chapel in April 2023.

Members of the committee assisted in planning the second annual ceremony to mark the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation on September 30, 2022 with Gimaa Stacey Laforme and the Mississaugas. The first *Chapel Explorations* event was held in March 2023. In *The Sacred in the Everyday* participants brought an object of personal importance and talked about its meaning. Alum [Audrey Rochette](#) moderated and

focused on material culture in Indigenous spirituality. This series is intended to open the Chapel as a space for sharing and learning, and will be continued in the coming year.

Anishinaabemowin lessons returned to the College in the winter term, running for eight weeks in the Chapel. The course will be repeated in both terms in 2023-24.

His Royal Highness The Duke of Edinburgh met with the MCFN at Massey for a ceremony to light the sacred fire and hold a Council meeting in the Chapel Royal to discuss the Duke of Edinburgh's Award program and its pathways for Indigenous youth. It was an honour to host the Council event here.

In March 2023, Massey College was honoured by a visit from Canon Paul Wright, Sub-Dean of the Chapel Royal.

In Spring 2023, the Ambassadors program was launched. Seven Junior Fellows enrolled and were given education sessions with [Darin Wybenga](#), historian of the MCFN. The Ambassadors participated in pow wows and other events, where they assist the community and continue to learn.

# Roberston Davies Library and The Bibliography Room

The [Robertson Davies Library](#) is our rare books and special collections library, distinguished by its focus on the history of the book and by its working nineteenth-century letterpress studio. Massey College also houses the Book History and Print Culture (BHPC) collaborative specialization, widely considered one of the leading book history programs in the world. Undergraduate and graduate classes from the University of Toronto, as well as academic institutions across Toronto, visit the Library and Bibliography Room throughout the year, participating in demonstrations and workshops with the special collections and presses.

## On Display

Exhibitions featuring material from the special collections, curated by graduate students from the Faculty of Information and BHPC program, received visitors from across the Massey and the U of T communities. In the spring, we exhibited Massey Journalism Fellow Alum **Jalal Nazari**'s Persian calligraphy and paintings, hosting a workshop and artist lecture that was widely attended. For Fall 2023, Acting College Librarian **Kathryn Middleton** curated an exhibition celebrating the College's 60th anniversary.

## On the Map

This year, the Bibliography Room and apprenticeship program were featured in University of Toronto Magazine, which garnered increased interest in workshops and tours. The Bibliography Room was also invited to participate

in the 45th annual Grimsby Wayzgoose and in the Small and Fine Press Fair hosted by the Thomas Fisher Library.

Assistant Librarian **Chana Algarvio** received a grant from the Consortium of European Research Libraries to work with their Retrospective National Bibliographies Working Group. She began incorporating relevant books from the Library into the records of national bibliographic databases, further increasing the visibility of the library on an international scale.

The logo combines old with new: printed from a typeface that's been in Massey's collection since the 70s, the logo integrates this font with imagery from Massey College's current branding. The Curwen Poster Type originated from Curwen Press, a well-known and beloved print studio that operated from 1863-1984 in London, England, and found its way to Massey College through Roy Gurney, former Superintendent of the Printing Department at University of Toronto Press. The typeface lives exclusively at Massey College and is one of many unique treasures within the Bibliography Room.




